LEVEL 2 AND 3 APPRENTICESHIPS IN YOUTH WORK PRACTICE

The apprenticeship is suitable for:

Individuals who work, or are looking to work, in a role where they are required to work as a Youth Support Worker. These roles could be within the statutory service or third sector.

Undertaking the programme will allow you to gain a temporary registration with the EWC as a Youth Support Worker, and a full membership upon successful completion of the qualification.

The 15 /16-month programme contains:

Level 2 (15-months)

- Level 2 Certificate in Youth work Practice

Level 3 (16-months)

- Level 3 Certificate in Youth Work Practice

Information to remember:

To start an apprenticeship in Wales, you need to:

- be aged 16 or over (no upper age limit)
- live in Wales
- not be in full-time education
- not be in receipt any other Welsh Government funding

If you are looking to undertake an apprenticeship qualification as a way of upskilling in your current role, you will also need to:

- be working for at least 16 hours a week
- have the support of your employer to undertake the qualification
- be working in a qualification-relevant role
- be employed for at least 51% of your contracted hours in Wales

All apprenticeship programmes include elements of Essential skills. The HWB specialises in helping apprentices develop their communication, numeracy and digital literacy skills. Depending on your current qualifications, some Essential skills qualifications will need to be completed as part of your programme. Our expert team will guide you every step of the way.
